BLOOMing Garden

Materials: Three sheets of tissue paper, stapler/string/tape, and scissors

Create your own BLOOMing garden with tissue paper!

- Step 1:** Lay out three sheets of tissue paper, stacked on top of each other.
- Step 2:** Accordion fold the stack of sheets.
- Step 3:** Place a staple in the center of the tissue paper to hold the folds in place (you can also use a fishing line or a piece of tape).
- Step 4:** Use scissors to cut each end into a rounded shape.
- Step 5:** Separate each layer of tissue paper and watch the flower BLOOM!
- Step 6:** You can use your flower for decoration on its own or make more flowers to fill up your garden!

What's BLOOMing?

Materials: Play-Doh

Optional Materials: Cookie cutters, rolling pins, and forks to cut, mold, shape, and imprint your Play-Doh

There is plenty of growing and BLOOMing in the Spring. Let's create flowers with playdough!

- Step 1:** Take a walk around your neighborhood to observe flowers or other plants blooming in your area. A trip to the floral area of the grocery store or a plant nursery can also give you great ideas! You may want to take a picture or make a quick drawing for reference.
- Step 2:** Use your Play-Doh to create flowers. Use household items to help add shape or texture to your flowers. You may make little balls to create a hyacinth flower. Flatten bigger balls to make rose petals. Roll Play-Doh into a snake shape for flower stems. Be creative!



BLOOMing Flowers

Materials: Crayons, flower page, and bowl with water

- Step 1:** Color your flowers from the flower page
- Step 2:** After your flowers are colored, carefully cut them out.
- Step 3:** Fold each petal of your flower toward the middle, so that the tips touch the middle of the flower.
- Step 4:** Get a bowl and fill it with $\frac{1}{2}$ inch of water.
- Step 5:** Gently place your folded flower in the water and watch the magic happen!
- Step 6:** Your flower will begin to BLOOM right before your eyes!



Planting Seeds

Materials : Bag of soil, peat pot, and one to two Nasturtium seeds

It's Spring and flowers are BLOOMing! Let's plant a flower of our own and watch it BLOOM!

- Step 1:** Take the bag of soil out of the peat pot.
- Step 2:** Take the small bag of seeds out of the bag with the soil.
- Step 3:** Decorate your peat pot with crayons and markers if you would like!
- Step 4:** Put the soil from the bag in the peat pot.
- Step 5:** Stick your finger into the soil, making a hole for the seeds about $\frac{1}{4}$ of the way down.
- Step 6:** Place seeds in the holes then pat soil over the holes.
- Step 7:** Water until the soil is moist.
- Step 8:** Put your freshly planted seeds near a window for sunlight.

Taking care of your Nasturtium plant: Water your seed occasionally; Nasturtium plants do best in dry, well-drained soil. Your plant will bloom throughout the summer so transfer your plant to an area with at least $\frac{1}{2}$ inch of soil in a sunny area!

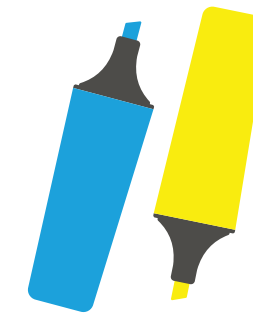


Coffee Filter Flowers

Materials: Pipe cleaner, coffee filter, pipette, marker, tape (optional)

Let's create a flower that will last forever!

- Step 1:** Find an area to work that can get wet.
- Step 2:** Color your coffee filter using markers.
- Step 3:** Use a pipette to drop some water onto the coffee filter.
- Step 4:** Dry your coffee filter for at least 30 minutes, to allow colors time to mix.
- Step 5:** Carefully poke a pipe cleaner through the center of the coffee filter (tape it into place if needed).
- Step 6:** Fold and crinkle coffee filter into a flower shape.
- Step 7:** (Optional) Layer more than one coffee filter on your flower as needed.



Growth in the Garden

Materials: Clothespin, pipe cleaner, coffee filter, and markers

Follow along with a video that will inspire you to think about how plants grow in the garden. Learn a BLOOM dance.

- Step 1:** Use markers to create a colorful pattern on the coffee filter. Allow time for it to dry.
- Step 2:** Insert the coffee filter into the clothespin to create butterfly wings.
- Step 3:** Wrap the pipe cleaner around the top of the clothespin to create antennas. Curl the ends.
- Step 4:** Have fun, flying your butterfly around your room or in the yard.



Sunflowers

Materials: Scissors, glue, yellow, brown, and green construction paper

Sunflowers are one of our favorites because they grow tall as if they are reaching for the sun. Let's make a sunflower of our own. Follow along with the video and we'll make it together. www.vimeo.com/487500477

Who Are We?

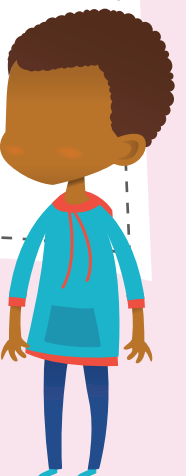

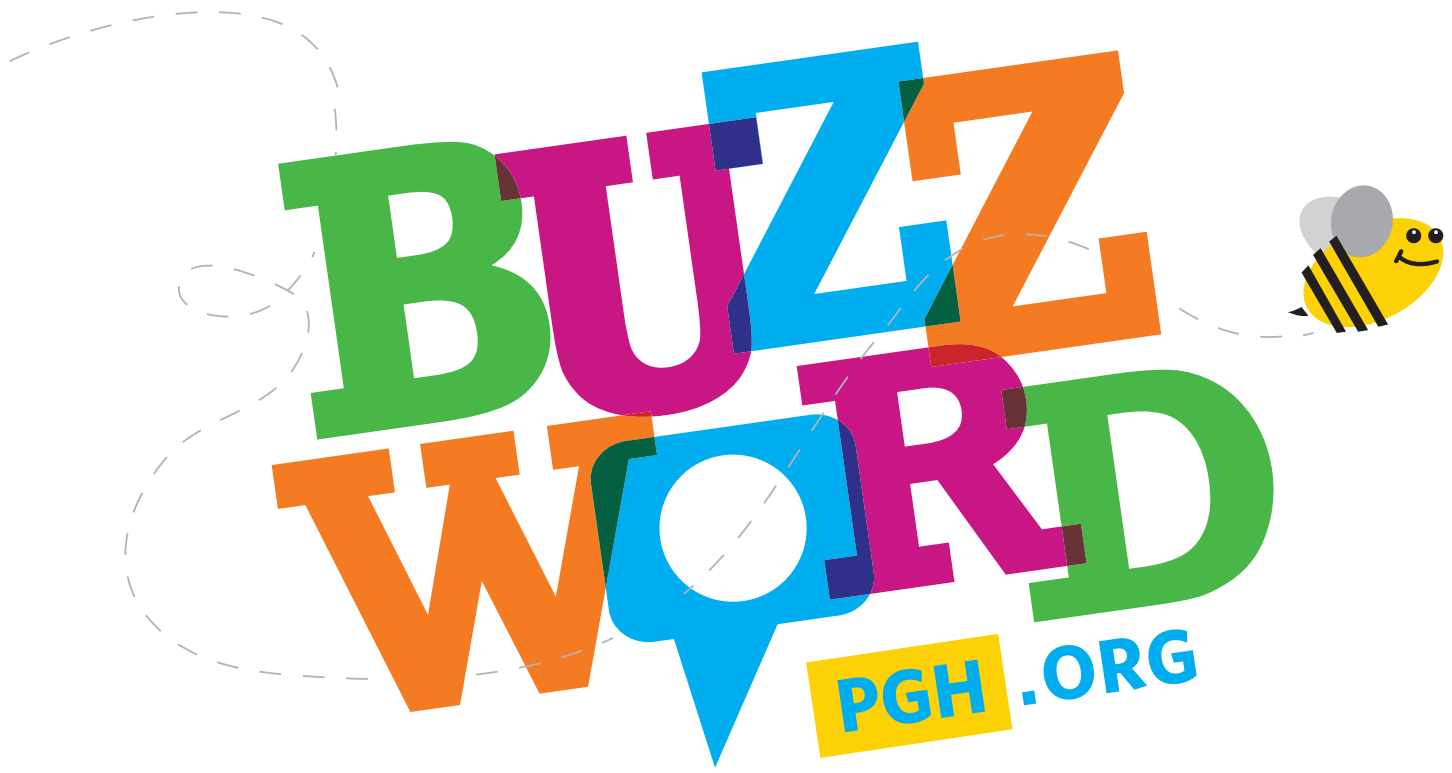
